

### **Thoughts and Actions**

Listening, thought and action are inter-connected with one another. A person's thoughts are formed based on what one hears, and in accordance with one's thoughts, the person acts.

An individual who lives in the company of saints will have an inclination towards God. An individual's actions are based on what one receives and imbibes from one's family, society and close relatives. Whatever one repeatedly hears, it unconsciously becomes his or her nature. Frequent talks about noble activities automatically become manifested in one's resolves. On the other hand, constantly listening to idle talk, gossip, criticism, etc hinders the progress of an individual.

with a passionate individual who is deeply under the influence of materialism, the worldly desires of a person may increase.

In order to keep performing good deeds and engaging in constructive work, the company of holy and noble people is recommended. Those who are alert, associate with noble ones, speak sweetly, have deep faith in the Truth, and trust God, are worthy of honor, irrespective of whether or not they possess material attainments. Such a person is considered as the highest amongst all beings. When one overcomes his or her defects then it becomes possible to assimilate divine qualities. No matter how sinful a person may be, he is not devoid of strength. One only needs to direct this strength towards the



performance of good deeds. Karma means work for which one receives guidance from the modes of nature.

Any act done against nature is *'vikarma'* (sinful or undesirable act), while to refrain from engaging in the performance of actions is *'akarma'* (inaction).

A person who is able to recognize this difference, is automatically able to choose auspicious acts over inauspicious ones. Nityakarma are the daily recommended activities performed in accordance scriptures. with Actions performed with a desire to

achieve a particular result are the cause of bondage, and are considered as inauspicious.

Sages and saints in their philosophical texts, for the welfare of mankind. accorded prominence to listening and action. If an ordinary individual merely listens to the wise ones, then his or her thinking will be transformed. He will be able to proceed on the path of spiritual development. It is hence essential that mankind should associate with true and noble beings, undertake competent resolves, and not allow the mind to waver. To see, hear. think or meaninglessly, is to lose discipline.

# Ganga Snaan on Baisakhi

The harvest festival of Baisakhi was celebrated in different parts of the country on April 13, 2014. On this day, *Ganga Snaan* i.e. taking a holy dip in the sacred River Ganges is considered to be extremely auspicious and meritorious.

Millions of devotees take a dip on Baisakhi in the Ganga River at Haridwar, Rishikesh and other places like Triveni Sangam in Allahabad. On this auspicious day, enthusiastic devotees flocked from all over India and abroad to Haridwar to visit H.H. Swamiji and take the holy dip. His Holiness to them the explained recommended way to offer obeisance to our sacred rivers.

He stated that we offer reverence to Ganga by *'snaan'* (taking a holy dip), Yamuna with *'aachman'*  (sipping), Narmada with 'darshan' (viewing) and Tapti by 'smaran' (remembrance). Further, H.H. Swamiji explained that we do Ganga snaan at the banks of the Ganges, since it is believed that is where her feet are. It is generally recommended to take nine dips.

Pujya Swamiji also emphasized the importance of fixing and following a proper routine in our daily lives. It is necessary to carry out our everyday activities such as awakening, selfpurification (cleansing), eating, drinking, sleeping, etc in an appropriate and timely manner.

We are encouraged to be mindful of what to do, when to do, and how much to do. If we can devote our daily routines to God, then that itself is *Sadhana*.

### Spiritual Q and A

Self-respect is *satvik* i.e. a pure tendency while pride is *tamasic,* a demoniac tendency.

To reflect – '*I am a spiritual* seeker, then how can *I* do something immoral or commit a sin?' This is self respect. But to consider oneself as superior or special as compared to others, and think, '*I am a seeker, while the other person is not*' is 'pride' or 'vanity'.

An egoistic person acts in a manner contradictory to the spiritual path, but one who has self-respect; will be unwilling to do something which is contradictory to spirituality.

In a particular village, once an educational officer arrived to inspect the local school. While on his rounds, the officer noticed that the teachers of that school were imparting education in both English and the local language. He politely said to one of the teachers, 'It is wonderful that you teach English and the local language of this state, however I see that you do not teach Hindi to the students. Hindi is our national language and is spoken throughout the country. If you will not teach it to the children, then these children will lag behind as compared to their peers. Hence, I suggest that you must teach them Hindi along with the other languages."

The officer replied, 'It is very easy to learn Hindi. You should try to learn it."



Hearing this, the education officer explained to him, "Whether a person is 20 or 80 years old, if his desire and eagerness to learn something new has died, then he is not only aged, rather I consider such a person to be lifeless. Lack of enthusiasm to acquire new skills makes a person obsolete. This sort of thinking is regressive and impedes progress."

This statement by the officer influenced the teacher deeply, and within a couple of weeks he mastered the Hindi language and began teaching it to the students.
